The Emergency Nurse is often one of the first health care professionals to provide care for the potential donor patient and family. Awareness of organ donation allows the Emergency Nurse to anticipate and provide care for both the patient and their family.

NENA supports the CNA position statement "Providing nursing care at the end of life" and believes the Emergency Nurse must be aware of ethical dilemmas, legal and medical criteria involved in the donor process.
